A Message from the Principal

As a new year approaches please note that applications for a Reception place in September 2021 are now open and the deadline for completing your application is Friday 15th January 2021. You can apply for a place using the following link https://cyp.halton.gov.uk/.../Synerg.../Parents/default.aspx . If your child currently attends The Grange Academy Nursery, then they will automatically be allocated a place in Reception without the need for an application.

The safety of our school community is of utmost importance so can I please remind all parents and carers to wear face coverings on the Plaza when dropping off and picking up your children. There have also been reported concerns around the importance of parking safely outside school on Latham Avenue at the start and end of the school day. Please be mindful not to obstruct other road users and not to park on the single lines or zig zag markings outside of school. 

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Polite Notices

Parking

Please read the message below from PC Tasker, Cheshire Constabulary

A complaint has been received regarding the parking of motor vehicles in the vicinity of The Grange Academy, Latham Avenue, in such a manner as to cause unnecessary obstruction to other road users and a danger to your children and their friends making their way to and from school.

Incidents of stopping/parking within the controlled area as defined by the single yellow lines and zigzag markings, all cause a danger to your children and obstruct other road users.

We are, therefore, asking for the co-operation of yourself and other users of your vehicle in this matter, in order to help in reducing the risk of accidents occurring at the location. Please, if you must drive your children to or from school, park well away from the school entrance and at a location which will not cause obstruction or a danger to any other person. As soon as your child is safely in the school or car, drive away promptly and safely, bearing in mind those children who are arriving/leaving on foot.

A number of parents/guardians have already received letters through the post advising them about their parking, these advisory letters will no longer be sent.

Finally, we much prefer to rely upon the willing cooperation of road users to reduce the hazards described above. Unfortunately, if that co-operation is not forthcoming, enforcement measures by fixed penalty or court proceedings may be the only alternative.

Littering

It has been brought to our attention, by a local resident, that there have been cases of littering on Latham Avenue. Could we please remind students to be courteous of the local community and ensure all litter is placed in nearby bins on their way to and from school.



Smoking on premises

A polite reminder to all members of the school community that we do not permit smoking on school premises. This includes all external communal areas and the school car park.



Water Bottles

It is advisable that students bring in their own drinks bottle (clearly labelled and filled) as the water fountains around school are currently turned off. Please be reminded that fizzy or energy drinks are not allowed.



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E-Safety

In each issue of the Newsletter we will focus on a different aspect of e-Safety to ensure all members of the school community are kept safe and informed.

Early use of digital technology has been shown to improve language skills and promote children's social development and creativity. But it is not without risks for young children, who may come across inappropriate content or begin to copy what older children do online. See the below advice to understand what you can do to give young children the best experience of going online.

Checklist for supporting 14+ year olds online

Checklist

- Adjust controls
 - Adjust the parental controls on your broadband and internet-enabled devices, depending on your child's age. Your broadband provider can tell you how. Find out how to setup safe search in Google by going to google.co.uk/safetycentre.

🕑 Keep talking

Stay interested in what they're doing online and discuss what they might have come across. Don't be afraid to tackle difficult subjects like cyberbulling and sexting.

Help them to be critical of things they see online and judge the quality and reliability of online sources.

Privacy matters

Make sure they set high privacy settings on social networks. Encourage them to regularly change their passwords and never to share or put online any of their personal details like phone number, address or their school.

Average child posts 26 times a day on social media - but only 6 - out of 10 followers are really friends

- Manage their online reputation Let them know that anything they upload, email or message could stay online forever. Remind them that they should only post things online that they wouldn't mind you, their teacher or a future employer seeing.
- Stay safe on the move

Make sure safety and privacy settings are activated on their mobile devices and they aren't sharing private information. Be aware that using public WiFi might not filter inappropriate content, so look for friendly WiFi symbols when you're out and about.

Are they chatting to strangers online?

Make sure they know that some people may not be who they say they are and tell your child how privacy settings can put them in control of who they talk to.

• Discuss what it means to be a 'friend' or a follower online, the pros and cons of having lots of these 'friends' and the importance of knowing that they're people you can trust.

• Be clear that if someone doesn't make you feel good about yourself, they're no friend.

Tell them about not replying to or blocking any followers they don't know. Make sure they know never to meet up with anyone they have only ever met online and don't know in person. Learn about it: Teach your child some simple rules

- Make sure your child knows how to block abusive comments and report content that worries them
- Teach them to respect others online and think about comments before they post them
- Don't arrange to meet people in real life that they've only talked to online and remind them that some people may not be who they say they are
- Use secure and legal sites to download music and games
- Check attachments and pop ups for viruses before they click or download anything
- When using the internet for homework, make sure they use information appropriately and explain things in their own words rather than copying

Talk about it:

- Tips for a meaningful conversation
 Make sure your child knows they can come to you if they're upset by something they've seen online
- Tell them you trust them to do the right thing rather than over monitoring their internet use
- If your child comes to you with an issue, stay calm and listen without judging them and don't threaten to take away their devices
- Tackle peer pressure by explaining that if they're talked into bullying someone online or sending inappropriate images it may get reported to their school or even the police
- Talk to them about how much time they spend online and make sure this is balanced against other activities
