Hello everyone. Thank you for taking the time to read our Newsletter. This month's issue is packed with some wonderful extra-curricular events to celebrate.

I want to invite you to reflect on a couple of characteristics and behaviours that we often recognise and value as being important. These are punctuality and attendance.

We all have busy lives. There are now so many competing pressures on our time and we all feel the strain of being where we need to be at a particular time. Most people would agree that being punctual and having good time management is important and is something we value in each other.

High levels of attendance in our work, at school and in our social lives be that in a sports team, a club or society are often seen as markers of people who are engaged, committed and reliable. Growing these characteristics in our children and establishing high expectations regarding punctuality and attendance are critical as our children grow up and learn to become adults.

Punctuality and attendance have a big part in how productive our children are in lessons and how focused they remain It gives them a greater feeling of being in control of their day and included within it. People who have good time management skills are often more organised and often have a much more positive self-perception. Good levels of punctuality and attendance can build a strong reputation for reliability and consistency.

We all feel more included and connected when we are regularly with our peers and in our networks. We are part of a strong community. This is one of the characteristics that makes our school a great place to learn and grow. To make the most of this, we have to be here as much as we possibly can and be on time.

Of course, there are times when people encounter challenges in their lives through illness, personal circumstances or a range of other situations that have an impact on attendance and punctuality. However, making sure that we are working together in these situations is important so that our children are able to access their learning environment fully so they feel included.

I would like to respectfully make just two modest requests. Firstly, where ever possible, strongly encourage our children to be in school regularly, to have excellent attendance. Please work together with us to help children who struggle to be more included, to be here in school as much as they can, so that they can learn and grow with their friends and classmates Secondly, please talk to your children about punctuality. In the secondary phase at the changeover between lessons, I have growing concerns with the number of children who drift into lessons or just wander around. This has a negative impact on their learning but also on the learning of other students. When children arrive late to lessons they often find it hard to fully engage and they feel that they are always trying to catch up. This can leave them feeling behind and disengaged with school. Having staff out and about, sweeping students into lessons should not really be the necessity it has become. The majority of our children are highly punctual and have high attendance. This shows me that having high expectations for these two behaviours is something that we as a wider community value. Thanks for your support. Warm regards

SECONDARY UNIFORM

Debate Mate Cup

On Wednesday 26th April, a group of 10 students travelled to Liverpool John Moore's University to take part in the Debate Mate Cup, competing as two teams against a large number of other schools. Students have been working with Debate Mate since November 2022 and this was an opportunity to round off their final session and really showcase their learned skills in front of other competitors.



Each team was given a motion, which they had 15 minutes to plan, prepare and write speeches for before delivering it to the opposing team. Each team was named either proposition or opposition and was compiled of three key speakers, who had five minutes each to speak, and one summary speaker who had three minutes to round up the debate.



The motions covered were around 'strikes being the most effective way to make change', 'banning non-essential cosmetic surgery' and 'should everyone go to university'. The diverse content of these motions really stretched our students out of their comfort zone and encouraged them to work together as a team, work under pressure and to a tight deadline. Students not only encouraged each other and worked together to share points, but confidently debated their ideas, took questions from the opposing side and were impressive in thinking on their feet when responding and raising questions to the opposition.

Following each debate, students received individual feedback from a mentor about their debating style, strengths and improvements, which really encouraged their resilience to progress in their following debates.

As part of the schedule, a Show Debate took place involving voluntary staff members from varying schools. Our very own Miss Evans volunteered to take part and was on the proposition team for the motion 'everyone age 12+ should have a bank account'. Miss Evans and her team put up a strong argument and won over the audience with their debate, becoming the winning team!

One of our student teams won two out of their three debates against Alsop and John Bosco, and we also received two individual awards as part of the prize ceremony at the end. Alex won an award for Best Floor Question when watching the Grand Final Debate around the motion that 'social movements have clearly identifiable leaders'. Alex showed confidence and integrity when asking her question to the whole lecture theatre. The other award went to Betty for Most Improved Speaker, as nominated by a Debate Mate mentor. Betty received a certificate and a £10 Nandos voucher for her efforts.







Students were a credit to the school during the visit and not only did they get a taste of university life, but our school ASPIRE values really showed through in each and every one of them for the effort they put in. Congratulations to you all.


<u>British Science Week Winners</u>

Ski Trip



Over Easter, 34 students and 4 staff departed The Grange to embark on their first school ski trip to Serre Chevalier, France.

The trip was a fantastic opportunity for students to develop their cultural capital by experiencing an adventurous activity in another country where they had to persevere in the face of many new situations and challenges. The trip pushed the boundaries for some students as they were out of their comfort zone and had to show bravery and resilience in the face of adversity in a range of situations. For some it was the first time they had been abroad and travelling without the security of family members.

The group experienced coach and ferry travel; some for the first time, and we did have a few green gills as students acquired their sea legs. I was amazed at how unbelievably patient the students were considering the high volume of trips that were departing for the continent and the pressure on the channel crossing.



When we arrived in resort students were exposed to French food, culture and the opportunity to practise some of their linguistic skills which helped bring some of the class room learning to life.

The accommodation was excellent, as was the food – although they did struggle to keep up with the demand for hot chocolate, fresh French baguettes and oranges for one student in particular.

We were extremely fortunate with the snow and weather conditions, as it was sunny every day despite being a little bit chilly in the morning on the way to the slopes. Some students (and staff) were caught out with the sunny conditions, despite wearing sun cream there were a number of 'Panda Eyes' and 'Rudolf Noses' that had developed by days 2 and 3.

Most of the group were beginner skiers, so it took a little time for them to acclimatise to the equipment and the techniques needed to get around on the mountain, but by the end of the week students had grown in confidence and the majority were able to get up the mountain using the chair lifts and tackle ski-ing on piste without too many falls.



At the end of the week the Ecole du Ski Francais (French Ski School) instructors assessed the group and presented them with certificates and badges as a reward for their endeavour and for the progress that they made. It was brilliant to see how proud some of the students were of their achievement and the reflection on the progress that had taken place since the beginning of their week.

Although the trip was focussed on Ski-ing, it was great to see how students developed socially too. Students socialised over games of UNO with the staff, enjoyed bowling and playing in the arcades and spent time in the local shops conversing with owners and purchasing souvenirs for family members. I'm positive that they have made some brilliant memories with their friends which will last a life time, and some lifelong learning lessons too.

As a final note I just wanted to say 'Thank you!' to the staff members who gave up their holiday time to accompany the trip, as without them we wouldn't have been able to provide such a vicarious learning opportunity for our students. Merci beaucoup!!




