## A Message from the Principal

Dear Parents and Carers,

#### **Challenge Partners**

During the week beginning Monday 13<sup>th</sup> January, we had an independent review carried out by Challenge Partners. Challenge Partners is a nationally recognised organisation that provides challenge and support to schools through a three day review process. We welcomed a review team of six experienced senior leaders from across the county which included a Lead OfSTED inspector, two National Leaders of Education (NLE) and leaders from other schools. We were delighted with the feedback and it supports our belief that we are moving rapidly in the right direction. Some key findings from the report stated that;

- 'Leaders demonstrate an ambitious vision for the success of the school. At all levels there is evidence of a commitment both to the journey of improvement and to a highly inclusive ethos.'
- 'The Primary curriculum is broad and balanced and includes input from specialist teachers in Physical Education and Music from the Secondary phase. Students benefit from a structured and well-sequenced approach to the teaching of Phonics. The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) learning environment is rich with high quality resources and continuous provision is well planned and managed. Children engage purposefully with a range of activities and are clearly enjoying and achieving.'
- Students in the Secondary phase experience a rich range of subjects including a number of creative disciplines.
- 'Students benefit from high quality and engaging classrooms.'
- 'Collaboration across the phases is becoming increasingly powerful and is leading to improved confidence amongst staff.'
- Leaders have established high expectations for students' behaviour and conduct around school. The Behaviour for Learning policy is clearly understood by staff and as a result students report that standards of behaviour have improved.'
- 'Over the last academic year, leaders have succeeded in improving levels of attendance and it is now close to the national average.'

The full report will be published on our website in the near future. I would like to take the opportunity to thank all the staff for their hard work and preparation for the review and also the students for their continued commitment to their learning.

#### Car Parking

Please can I remind parents and carers that dropping off and picking up of students should not take place on Latham Avenue and that the designated drop off zone or parking bays should be used. It is important that all our students are safe when coming to and from school. Please do not park in the drop off zone or block in other vehicles. Thank you for your consideration in this matter.

In the Secondary phase students are able to replace equipment from their respective wing during form time. ### Volunteers wanted

Attendance and Punctuality

We have seen an improvement in the number of pupils arriving to school on time - well done and thankyou

Please remember school starts at 8.40am. We begin learning at this time so please ensure your child is on time so that they can maximise their learning time. A few minutes late each day adds up to almost half an hour or an hour late each day and this makes a huge difference to a child.

We receive weekly Picture News resource, including a current news story, a linked image, a thought-provoking question and a variety of teaching resources to support assembly and form time delivery. These promote Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development (SMSC) as well as Modern British Values (MBV) in both phases of the school whilst developing oracy through discussion work, reading and writing.

TikTok is a social media app that gives users the opportunity to share 60 second short videos with friends, family or the entire world. Like Musical.ly before it, it is most popular with under 16s. It has also now become the most downloaded app of 2019. 13 is the minimum age according to TikTok's terms and conditions. However, please be aware of the concerns around the inappropriate language of some of the videos posted which may make this less suitable for younger children.

In addition, there are ongoing concerns re predators seeking to connect with children via the app. When you download the app users can see all the content without creating an account although they are not able to post, like or share anything until they've set up an account on the app. By default all accounts are public so anyone on the app can see what your child shares. Users can like or react to a video, follow an account or send messages to each other. There is the risk that strangers will be able to directly contact children on the app. Children may be tempted to take risks to get more of a following or likes on a video so it's important to talk about what they share and with who.

**MYEd** is the free parent app that gives you a multitude of communication and information features to stay in touch with what is going on at school. The app gives you direct access to your child's attendance, timetable, absence records, achievements, behaviour and much, much more. We are able to send you messages directly to the **MYEd** app relating to important information about your child's education and to remind you of events that are taking place at school. You will receive a notification if we send you a message and there is no charge for the messages you send to us.
