## A Message from the Principal

Dear Parents and Carers,

We are fast approaching the end of this academic year and although there are only three weeks left, the school is still incredibly busy.

Due to a rise in Covid-19 rates locally we have recommended testing of Secondary students once per week. Can I ask for your support to ensure that they are taking a further test at home and the results are reported to the school. No one wants 'bubbles' sent home and required to self-isolate. Regular testing is an important step to ensure we keep students in school and our community safe.

During the last few weeks we will have several visits to the school from colleagues at the Wade Deacon Trust (WDT). These visits are to quality assure the work that we do and also as part of our commitment to keep improving the provision for our students, your children. Even though the year has been challenging we are still committed to making this school the best it can be. Therefore, for the last few weeks can I still ask for your support in ensuring your children are well equipped, attend on time and in full school uniform and demonstrate our motto of 'Aspire for Excellence.' I know many students are tired, but it is important we do not lose any learning time.

Additionally to the visits from colleagues in the WDT, we will be undertaking another Challenge Partner review which will begin on Monday 5<sup>th</sup> July. This is an external review, led by a current OfSTED inspector, and although this will take place remotely due to the local restrictions, we know it will be a valuable process. I will share their findings with you following the review.

Over the summer holidays the school will be a hive of activity. We are having many of the areas re-painted and new flooring is being laid too. We are having a new 3G pitch surface and many classrooms in both phases are having new interactive screens and computers. This involves over 100 new computers and over 40 new screens across the school. All this work is part of our commitment to providing the best possible facilities and education for your children. This work will ensure that the school is looking its best and ready for a positive, and less disrupted, new academic year.

During the final week of the summer holidays we will be hosting our Summer School to support the transition of current Year 6 students into Year 7. Finally, please can I ask for your consideration when phoning the school office to speak to a member of staff. 


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## **PRIMARY**


Neve R obert

Year 5 explored mixing colours, blending, shading and different stroke techniques when using watercolours as apart of their project—Window by Jeannie Baker









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


## **SECONDARY**

So far this term we have seen some excellent examples of work from our Secondary students. Here are just a few samples.





### **MIDWIFE**

Most jobs are in the NHS but you could also work in private hospitals and clinics, or overseas.

Your day-to-day tasks could include:

- Giving pregnant women advice on issues like healthy eating
- Explaining options like giving birth in hospital or at home
- Running classes about pregnancy (antenatal) and parenting
- Checking the health of mother and baby during pregnancy

#### During labour, you'll:

- Check how labour is progressing
- Monitor the baby during labour
- Give pain relief or advise on ways to manage pain
   Deliver the baby

- Call a doctor if you notice any problems

After the baby's born, you'll give advice to families on caring for their baby.

You could also visit people's homes to check on mother and baby.


