Overall evaluation summary

Successes

- 1) Swimming. We finally got pool time this year and were able to take Year 6 pupils swimming. The improvement over a short and concentrated time was fantastic. What was also very rewarding was to see some children thrive who struggle academically. Their self-esteem and positivity was huge. Some children found swimming a challenge and staff had to work hard to get some children to attend the sessions. The plan is to take Y6 next year but also younger age children to avoid the body issues that arise in Year 6
- 2) Competition. We joined a different competition structure this year and this was amazingly successful. We won most events and children from Y1-Y6 competed across a range of sports. The trophy cabinet is full. The events also rewarded most improved performances and this allowed a range of children to shine
- 3) Range of opportunities. Through after school activities and additional events we were able to offer the pupils a wide range of opportunities to experience different sports. This year we offered fencing, judo, orienteering, dance, quidditch and gymnastics through external providers and this enhanced our PE and Sport offer which was already strong.
- 4) Yard equipment. A huge amount of equipment was purchased to encourage games on the yard. Younger pupils really enjoyed playing with the large parts equipment which allowed them to build trails and obstacle courses which they really enjoyed

Areas to develop

- 1) Minibus drivers – we do not have enough drivers for the bus and this limits the opportunity to take pupils out
- 2) Live sport – it would be good to get children to see live sport events but the timings of events have not been easy and pupils concentration levels make the event difficult – more about the picnic than the event
- 3) Rewards and prizes – we need to develop a sustainable way to reward pupils for their work and achievements.
